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Why is the sanctuary red for Pentecost?

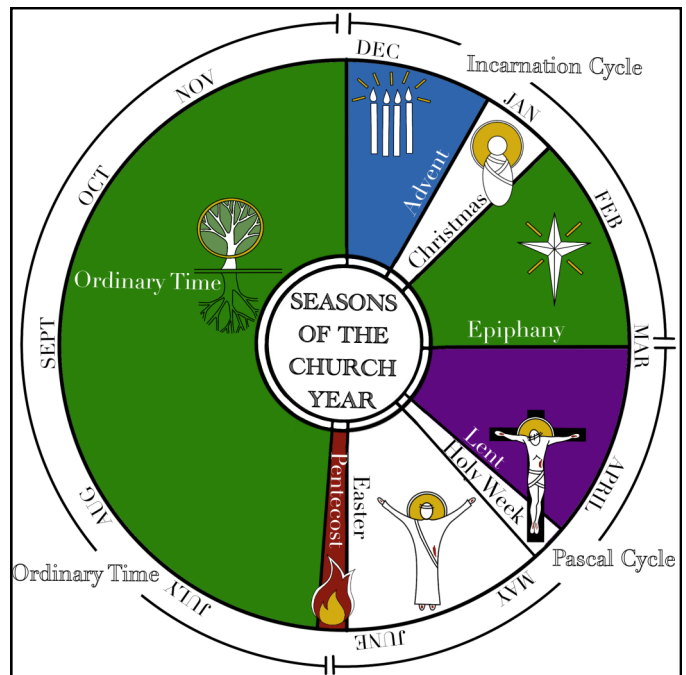
Many Christian traditions, including Presbyterians, follow a calendar that emphasizes different “seasons” of the church year, sometimes called the liturgical calendar. It begins with Advent, the period leading up to Christmas, and continues through seasons like Epiphany, Lent, Easter, Pentecost, and Ordinary Time.

Advent marks the beginning of the liturgical year, typically starting four Sundays before Christmas. This season is characterized by themes of anticipation and preparation for both the celebration of the birth of Christ and the awaited return of Jesus at the Second Coming.

Following Christmas, the season of Epiphany focuses on the revelation of Christ to the Gentiles, represented by the Magi, and includes significant events such as Jesus' baptism and early miracles. Lent, a 40-day period of reflection and penance, prepares believers for Holy Week, culminating in Easter, the celebration of Christ's resurrection.

Pentecost occurs fifty days after Easter, celebrating the descent of the Holy Spirit and the birth of the Church. It marks a shift in focus from the life of Christ to the growth of the Church and its mission in the world. Following Pentecost is Ordinary Time, the longest season, which continues throughout summer and autumn. This period is not ordinary in the sense of being mundane, but is named for the ordinal numbers that designate each Sunday (5th, 12th, 21st, etc.).

The use of specific colors during these seasons—blue in Advent, purple in Lent, white and gold for Christmas and Easter, and red at Pentecost—serves to visually communicate the theological themes of each period.
